## New Hope Arts installs a golden arch near gateway

The most recent addition to New Hope's Outdoor Sculpture Project is Jim Gallucci's "Golden Oak Leaf Arch," hosted by Rabbit Run Creek, adjacent to Route 202 and the Solebury - New Hope Walking Path.

Sculptor Jim Gallucci, of Greensboro, N.C., is internationally known for his large-scale metalwork. The

long-awaited placement on Saturday, Jan. 12 required site preparation by Rabbit Run Creek and the crane of exhibition specialist and sculptor Harry Gordon, of Lambertville.

The 13-foot-high powder-coated steel construction, is included in New Hope's ongoing, accessible and free outdoor sculpture exhibition.

The Sculpture Project currently features 18 contemporary works by regional and national artists. Begun in 2003, New Hope Arts' outdoor exhibition continues with the support and partnership of patrons who sustain and maintain this walkable family-friendly public art display.

Pamm Kerr of New Hope and Stockton, N.J., is sponsor for the four new works installed in 2018, including this latest addition. Over its 15-year history the Sculpture Project has displayed more than 80 works.
